




The Statewide Unemployment Rate Is Very Low

Labor force drop-outs




Still some room for labor force growth






Long-Term Unemployment is Shrinking








Mainers aged 25-54 in the Coastal Counties haven't worked in the past year

Potential workers held back by health, family obligations




Reasons not in the labor force for 25-54 year-olds in Maine, year ending October 2019


One Quarter of Prime-Age Mainers Don't Have Full-Time, Year-Round Work

Underemployed Part-Timers Outnumber the Unemployed






Mainers aged 18-64 have an arrest record



That's 17% of the working-age population




Mainers with Recent Arrest Records More Likely to Be Unemployed
