Comprehensive One-Stop Center

- A physical location where job seeker and employer customers can access the programs, services, and activities of all required One-Stop partners.
- The Chief Elected Official (CEO) for a local area must designate at least one comprehensive One-Stop Center in the local area.
- Comprehensive American Job Centers should reflect and exemplify the characteristics of a high-quality American Job Center as described in DOL's TEGL No. 4-15, and ED's RSA-TAC-15-01 and OCTAE Program Memorandum 15-3, entitled Vision for the One-Stop Delivery System under the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act.

Lancaster Street Location



- The current One-Stop Comprehensive Center is located at 190 Lancaster Street in Portland
- The lease for the current One-Stop Comprehensive Center expires in March 2022
- A decision must be made about whether to renew the space in Summer of 2021

Requirements for One-Stop

A comprehensive American Job Center must have:

- At least one WIOA title I staff person physically present, and the Center must provide the career services listed in 20 CFR 678.430, 34 CFR 361.430, and 34 CFR 463.430;
- 2) Access to training services described in 20 CFR 680.200;
- Access to any employment and training activities carried out under section 134(d) of WIOA;
- 4) Access to programs and activities carried out by one-stop partners listed in 20 CFR 678.400 through 678.410, 34 CFR 361.400 through 361.410, and 34 CFR 463.400 through 463.410, including the Wagner-Peyser Act ES program; and
- Workforce and labor market information.

Required Partners

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- A. WIOA title I programs (29 U.S.C. chapter 32):
 - Adult, Dislocated Worker, and Youth formula programs;
 - Job Corps;
 - YouthBuild;
 - Native American Programs;
 - National Farmworker Jobs Program
- B. Employment Services authorized by the Wagner-Peyser Act (29 U.S.C. 49 et seq.) as amended by WIOA title III
- C. Senior Community Service Employment Program, authorized under title V of Older Americans Act of 1965;
- D. Trade Adjustment Assistance (TAA), authorized under chapter 2 of the title II of the Trade Act of 1974;
- E. Unemployment Compensation (UC) programs;
- F. Jobs for Veteran's State Grants (JSVG) programs, authorized under chapter 41 of title 38, U.S.C.; and
- G. Reentry Employment Opportunities (REO) programs, authorized under sec. 212 of the Second Chance Act of 2007 (42 U.S.C. 17532) and WIOA sec. 169;
- H. Adult Education and Family Literacy Act (AEFLA) program, authorized under WIOA title II;
- Career and technical education programs at the postsecondary level, authorized under the Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act of 2006 (Perkins IV); and
- J. The State Vocational Rehabilitation (VR) Services program, authorized under title I of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. 720 et seq.), as amended by WIOA Title IV;
- K. Employment and Training Programs funded through the Department of Housing and Urban Developed
- Employment and training activities carried out under the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) programs (42 U.S.C. 9901 et seq.); and
- M. Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program, authorized under part A of Title IV of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 601 et seq.), unless exempted by the Governor under 20 CFR 678.405(b), 34 CFR 361.405(b), and 34 CFR 463.405(b);

Roles of One-Stop Partners

What are the roles and responsibilities of the required partners?

The roles and responsibilities of the required One-Stop partners are stated in 20 CFR § 678.420. Each required One-Stop partner program must:

- Use a portion of its funds to provide applicable career services and work collaboratively with the state and LWDBs to establish and maintain the one-stop delivery system; including jointly funding the One-Stop infrastructure costs through partner contributions;
- Provide access to its programs or activities through the AJC network;
- Enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the LWDB relating to the operation of the AJC network;
- Participate in the operation of the AJC network consistent with the terms of the MOU, requirements of authorizing laws and implementing regulations, Federal cost principles, and all other applicable legal requirements;
- Provide representation on the state workforce development board and local boards as required, and participate in board committees, as needed.
